Outdoor Trust Walk

Choose a safe, enclosed area, like a backyard or a small park, and mark a start area and a finish area. One player is blindfolded, turned around a few times, and moved a few steps away from where he or she started. Another player acts as a guide. The guide helps the blindfolded player get to the finish area without touching him or her, and can only give voice cues, like "walk until you step on a branch," "walk left, turn right, step forward." This game can be played by multiple players, making it trickier and more competitive.
