

## Jim Houston goes the distance for seniors in his community

JIM HOUSTON, RETIRED LOCOMOTIVE ENGINEER AND PROVINCIAL UNION OFFICER, SARNIA, ON

hen CN Railroader in the Community Jim Houston of Sarnia, ON, retired from CN in 1995 after 38 years of service, he had no intention of taking it easy.

"I don't golf, and I needed something to keep my mind active," says Jim, whose last position at CN was as a locomotive engineer and provincial union officer. "Plus, it was ingrained into my brother and me when we were kids that you must give back to your community. I'm involved in CN Pensioners at the local, provincial, and national levels, and I've been a member of the Knights of Columbus for 59 years. I'm a busy guy and that's the way I like it."

In 1997, Jim became involved with the Lambton Seniors Association, a non-profit funded by the United Way that provides services and advocacy for seniors. Facing a serious shortage of family physicians to serve a growing population, Jim spearheaded an effort to form a community health centre, and a family health team facility in 2001. It took nearly six years of tireless efforts and Jim "bugging the daylights out of the provincial government," but the team made it happen.



Jim's charity has received five CN Railroaders in the Community grants, which have been invested into seniors' programs. In recognition of his exceptional long-term contributions to improve the quality of life in his community and the province, Jim was presented with the Ontario Medal of Good Citizenship in December. Thanks

to this honour, Jim's organization will receive an additional \$12,500 grant from CN.

"I think CN's program is unbelievable," says Jim. "I was only the coach; I was fortunate to have had a championship team that got the job done."
