s **Eric Hussey** neared retirement, he began devoting himself to his community. Since joining the Lion's Club in 1999, Eric has volunteered 50 hours each month, serving on many committees and chairing fundraising efforts for food banks, hospitals and youth organizations.

"Volunteering keeps me busy, young and active, and the reward comes from helping others," says Eric, who retired in 2002 as an Engineering Field Maintainer after 30 years of service. Eric has received several awards, including the Queen's Jubilee Medal and The City of Moncton Volunteer Citizen of the Year Award.

"Winning this contest is very exciting, and I'm thrilled that CN recognizes the very valuable work that we're doing," says Eric.

CN's grant will go to the Montreal Shriners Hospital for Children and the Portage Atlantic rehabilitation centre for recovering substance abusers, and will be used to fund high school scholarships as well. ### **On-call for a tight-knit community**

For the volunteer for the Valemount Volunteer Fire Department, Everett Craig couldn't wait to turn 18 and get involved.

"Coming from a small town of 800 people, everyone knows each other, so helping out feels natural," says Everett, who joined CN in 2011.

Everett spends 100 hours each year oncall or training. Winning \$5,000 means his fire department can pay for tools and equipment used in advanced training.

"In order for firefighters to enter a burning building and do fire suppression from the inside, you have to have live burn training," he explains. "Without this facility, the department would spend thousands sending everyone out of town to train. It's very heartwarming that CN gives to charities that their employees care about."
