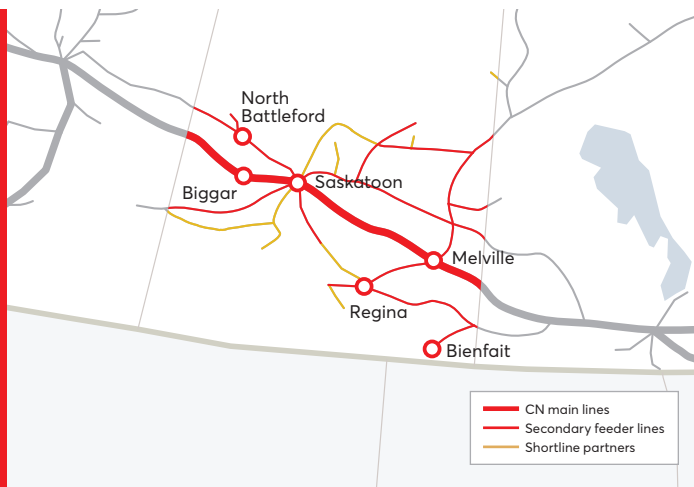

Grains and fertilizers, especially potash, make up most of the traffic handled by CN in this Prairie province. Our traffic also reflects the increasing diversification of the Saskatchewan economy by handling growing volumes of consumer goods and specialty crops through our intermodal terminal in Saskatoon and Canada's first privately operated intermodal terminal in Regina. Both Saskatoon and Bienfait boast metals distribution facilities. Saskatoon, where almost 500 CN railroaders live and work, also has an automotive distribution centre. Melville is home to CN's largest rail classification yard in Saskatchewan and has close to 400 CN employees. Finally, in North Battleford, we have a forest products distribution facility.

Network Investments

Over the past decade, CN has invested about \$2.1 billion to build and maintain a safe and efficient network in Saskatchewan and to support our supply chain partners. Expansion projects included rebuilding bridges and upgrading track and switches to better serve grain customers. Maintenance projects focused on the replacement of rail and ties, plus upkeep of crossings, bridges, culverts, signals, and other track infrastructure.

The event was held in conjunction with Ag in Motion, a major outdoor farm show CN sponsors that draws 30,000 farmers from across Western Canada.

Community Investments

In 2024, CN contributed to many Saskatchewan-based organizations, including:

YWCA REGINA By providing childcare, shelter and housing, community programs, family support programs, and outreach, YWCA Regina supports women and families in the realization of their full potential to the benefit of the entire community. CN contributed to the Y's capital campaign.

SHOCK TRAUMA AIR RESCUE SERVICE STARS provides safe, rapid, highly specialized emergency medical transport by helicopter air ambulance across the Canadian Prairies. With STARS, those living and working in remote areas, travelling on highways, or being transported from community medical centres to major hospitals receive the absolute best in critical care. CN sponsored their Field of STARS fundraising dinner.

WANUSKEWIN HERITAGE PARK Wanuskewin, a sacred site and gathering place for more than 6,400 years, works to advance the understanding and appreciation of the evolving cultures of the Northern Plains Indigenous peoples. CN contributed to their "Thundering Ahead" campaign to help Wanuskewin reach its full potential and take its place among Canada's premier cultural destinations.

KACHUR WEALTH COMMUNITY ARENA Like in most Canadian towns, the arena in Clavet is a community hub, hosting numerous hockey teams and the Clavet Skating Club. CN donated to their "Raise the Roof" capital project to upgrade the roof and add concrete flooring for year-round activities.

LITTLE BEAR CHILD CARE CENTRES Little Bear is a network of Indigenous-led, inclusive early learning centres with locations in Saskatoon and La Ronge. Programs include infant, toddler and preschool care in both centers. CN donated to the acquisition of therapy equipment.
